



District 6 Safety Meeting in February Produces Positive Connections

Safety was the focus at the February roundtable discussion in District 6, that brought together residents of at least five different neighborhoods. The meeting, held Thursday, Feb. 9 at Wilson Middle School, garnered over 50 attendees, who met with city representatives from Albuquerque Police Department (APD), Neighborhood Watch, the Office of Neighborhood Coordination (ONC), Transit, and City Councilor Pat Davis. Topics ranged from how to create a neighborhood watch to multimodal safety for pedestrians, bus riders and cyclists, home safety, business safety, and liquor sales and public safety.



The meeting organizers, Melinda Frame and Ann Beyke, residents of the Parkland Hills neighborhood, shared insights about the roundtable. "Safety is a personal issue, as well as a law enforcement issue," said Melinda after the meeting. "I think everyone who attended the meeting realizes that we, too, can take part in making our neighborhoods and our homes safer."

What Is A Neighborhood Watch?

A neighborhood watch program (NWP) creates the opportunity for neighbors to collaboratively work with the Albuquerque Police Department (APD) to prevent crime in their neighborhoods. A connected community is safer because neighbors know who should be in their neighborhood, watch out for each other, and communicate with APD and their neighbors when they see something suspicious.

NWPs are organized around blocks of approximately 10-15 homes. The block captain organizes the neighborhood watch and serves as a communication facilitator, but a NWP works best if each neighbor acknowledges responsibility to secure property and work together. Participants prevent crime by serving as additional eyes on the street, being educated on crime prevention tactics, and building tight-knit communities.

Recently, an NWP in the NE part of Albuquerque was able to connect someone to their stolen goods after a recent break-in elsewhere, when a fellow neighbor reported finding two bags of possessions near their home. This only happened because the neighbors reported what happened so their block captain could connect the two seemingly isolated events.

Tree Planted at UNM Tight Grove Area

A historical grove of trees on the University of New Mexico (UNM) campus had a recent addition to its plantings. An evergreen tree was planted in the Tight Grove area on Monday, April 10 by City and UNM leadership as part of the ongoing Albuquerque Rapid Transit (ART) project. The Tight Grove, named after UNM's third president, William G. Tight, who planted the 30 evergreen trees still there today, is located near Central and University. That corner is expected to be one the most heavily used ART stations when the project is completed in late 2017.

The University and Cornell ART stations will give UNM students, faculty and staff another way of getting to and from campus, and easier access for students and visitors to visit New Mexico's flagship university. WaterSmart Workshops Teach About Maximizing Water Use

The Albuquerque Bernalillo County Water Utility Authority (ABCWUA) is offering free WaterSmart Workshops through October on a variety of topics related to water use, xeriscaping, planting trees and gardening, drip irrigation systems, and how to best maximize water use in the summer and throughout the year.

Eligible ABCWUA customers can earn a \$20 credit on their water bill for each workshop attended over a 5-year period.

The workshops are free, and limited to 50 people each. Each workshop takes place at the Desert Oasis Teaching Gardens, Albuquerque Academy Campus, 6400 Wyoming NE, and runs from 9:00 a.m. - 11:00 a.m.

The next class takes place on Saturday, May 6 and covers Urban Gardening Growing Techniques, with six additional workshops on this topic running through the end of July, as well as other topics.

Spring Green Waste Collection Coming to Your Neighborhood



Got green waste from spring cleaning your yard? Solid Waste will pick up green waste on your regular trash day during the weeks of May 1 - 5, and May 8 - 12.

Leaves, branches, grass, and brush must be in tightly secured trash bags, and cannot weigh over 40 lbs each. Branches must be cut to 4-foot lengths and securely bundled. Any green items for pickup must be placed at your curb by 7:00 a.m. on your regular trash day.

The following items will not be picked up by Solid Waste:

- Dirt and construction debris
- Gravel and construction materials
- Tree stumps

Property Crime Reporting Technicians Are Newest Addition to APD

Albuquerque Police Department's latest hires are not regular police officers. The 16 newly hired Property Crime Reporting Technicians (PCRT) came into APD as part of the City's property crime reduction pilot program that came about after Mayor Richard Berry's crime reduction plan was announced last October. The plan called for hiring a specialized unit of civilian technicians to alleviate the workload on sworn police officers called to respond to property crime calls.

The hiring of these PCRTs means that they will be able to more quickly respond to citizens who have experienced property theft, and allow officers to respond to more urgent calls in the community. The PCRTs complete on-the-job training and start official duties in mid-May.

City Councilors Pat Davis, Brad Winter and Ken Sanchez joined Mayor Berry and Chief Administrative Officer Rob Perry, and Chief Gorden Eden of APD, to introduce the new hires at a press conference Wednesday, April 5 at the Police Training Academy.

The city is well into the process of replacing its 1970s Zoning Code with updated standards for a 21st century, southwestern city in a new Integrated Development Ordinance (IDO). Part of this process includes converting the 700+ zones that the City struggles to enforce and administer correctly with a set of just 20 codes.

The EPC will hold a 4th hearing on the IDO on Thursday, May 4, and vote on a recommendation to Council on whether to adopt, with a tentative 5th hearing scheduled for Monday, May 15. Both hearings will take place at 8:30 a.m., at Plaza del Sol, 600 2nd St. NW, Basement Hearing Room. No more public testimony or written comments will be considered by the EPC, but you are still encouraged to send written comments, which will be added to the project case file and forwarded to the City Council for consideration at the next stage in the review/approval process.
